SHORT BIOGRAPHY Matthias Claudius Hofmann, M. A.

Matthias Claudius Hofmann (b. 1978) studied ethnology and religious studies in Göttingen, Apia (Samoa) and Wellington (New Zealand).

His research interest is Polynesian ethnography, with a particular focus on Samoa. In addition to exploring the region's material culture and oral tradition he conducts ethnological research into objects and the theory of gift exchange.

For a number of years he worked as a museum educator for the Ethnographic Collection at Göttingen University, and as a research assistant he worked on the redesign of the permanent exhibition on Polynesia in 2010. In cooperation with the university library, in 2012 he co-curated Samoa - People, Landscape and Culture in the South Pacific One Hundred Years Ago, a special exhibition of photos taken between 1902 and 1905 by Otto Tetens, a natural scientist from Göttingen.

After spending twelve months in Samoa doing field research in 2014/15, he completed a scholarly traineeship from 2016 to 2018 at the Weltkulturen Museum. During this period he curated the exhibition And the Beat Goes On... Barkcloth from the Collections of the Weltkulturen Museum in 2017.

In 2018 he took over the Oceania section of the collection, initially in a stand-in capacity, and since 2020 as the official curator. He is co-curator of the current special exhibition Worlds in Motion: Narrating Migration (2019-2021).
